In 1994 the government mandated the use of a maximum of 1.6 gallons of water per toilet flush. The intended water savings were not immediately rec-

ognized, however, because it often took 2 or more flushes to empty the bowl. This double flush dilemma has since been solved by new technology, cutting water usage by 50%. Since toilet-flushing accounts for about 25% of a home's water usage, the savings can be significant.

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Get Rid of Unwanted Houseguests

...at least the four-legged variety

Nothing says home like a houseful of family and friends. But there are some guests that, no matter how well intentioned they may be, just aren't welcome (I'm not talking about the in-laws!). They eat your food, diminish your property value, and can wreak havoc on your home systems.

carbon monoxide detector, and emergency flashlight batteries. This should be done every six months since batteries lose energy even when they are not in use. Test fire extinguishers to be sure they are functioning properly too.

Clean Windows, Shades, and **Curtains**

Remove and wash window treatments. Clean blinds to remove dust. White vinegar or ammonia solutions should be used to wash windows. If you also replace storm windows with screens, be sure to make any needed repairs before storing.

Put Out a Fire

Smoke alarms and fire extinguishers have been common household safety features for quite some time, but what about fire sprinkler systems?

Though they've mostly been the province of commercial buildings, increased use is now reaching residential areas. And with more than 400.000 residential fires leading to 3,000-plus deaths in a year's time, they're a timely addition to home safety.

According to the U.S. Fire Administration, homeowners who install sprinkler systems gain the advantages of a safer environment for their families, as well as protection for their home and possessions. Residential fire sprinklers can also lower insurance rates between 5 and 15%.

Unlike the bulky eyesores common to industrial venues, residential sprinklers are smaller, use less water and can be connected to the home water supply. Because they can be recessed or partially recessed and come in colors to match ceiling and walls, they won't stick out like sore thumbs among your other attractive home decor.

The cost of installation at time of construction is minimal - ranging somewhere around \$1,500 to \$2,000 for a 2,000-square-foot home. Yet it's also possible to install sprinkler systems in existing homes.

Though homeowners may have concerns about water damage, the U.S. Fire Administration points out that damage caused by sprinklered water is substantially less than damage from fire department hoses or an undetected fire.
